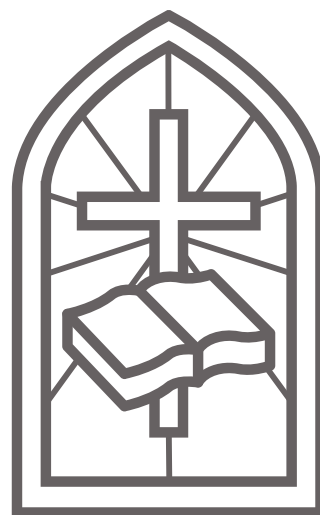

- The word "Advent" comes from the Latin "advenio," meaning "to come to," and refers to the coming of Christ.
- The Advent period reminds Christians to remember and prepare for the celebration of Jesus' birth and His triumphant second coming.
- In the four weeks leading up to Christmas to remember and prepare for ourselves spiritually for Jesus' birth and the church invites us into a period of prayer and reflection throughout this time.
- During this time, we will engage in Masses at Church, attend Advent Liturgies and celebrations of the word and our final end of term celebrations of Advent Masses for the Parish will take place in school.

Our weekly reflections remain a meaningful part of our liturgical prayer at SPH, allowing all in our school community learn about and reflect on relevant liturgical themes and feast days within that week. The key themes are listed below:

Weekly Reflections

9/09- Encounter: To encounter Christ to have a personal experience of God's love and presence.

16/09 - Identity: A sense of who we are as individuals

23/09 - Understanding: The ability to grow in awareness of one another and the world around us.

30/09 - Solidarity: The feeling of unity and support of others.

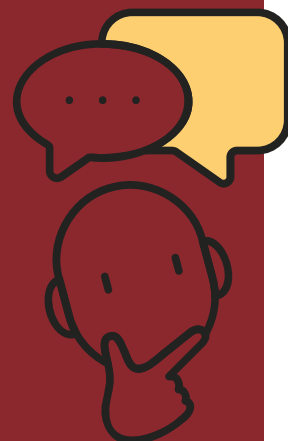
07/10 - Rosary: A prayer that we can all use to meditate on the life and death of Jesus Christ.

4/11 - Accompaniment: The act of working with someone on their journey.

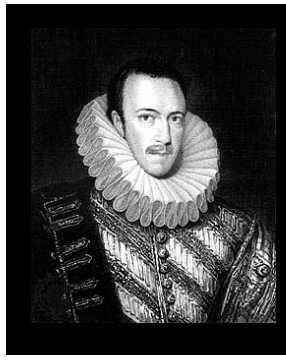
11/11 - Remembrance Day: We remember the saints, and those who have died and the events of our history.

' Bless us, O Lord, and these your gifts which we are about to receive from your bounty. Through Christ our Lord. Amen'

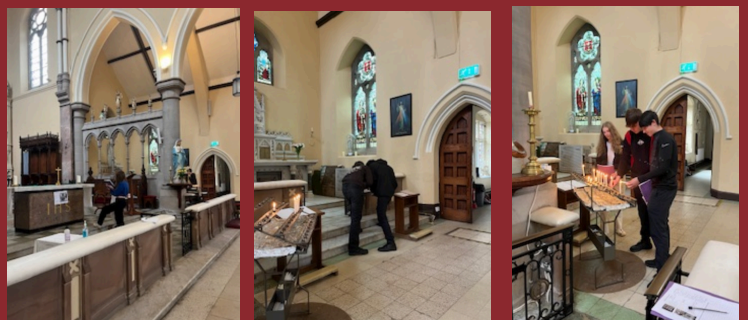
Grace before meals is said everyday during period 3 lesson, in order to give thanks for the food we are about to receive



Our parish church St Mary's

Year 11 students recently took their Religious Education lesson beyond the classroom walls and into the heart of our local Church to explore its architecture and features, This hands-on experience provided an invaluable opportunity for students' to see and engage with the elements they study in RE.

As they explore the Church, students observed significant features such as the altar, lectern, tabernacle, and Stations of the Cross. Being physically present helped them appreciate the beauty and purpose behind these sacred features.



THE SAINTS OF SPH

St Philip Howard - St Philip Howard, the Saint after whom the school was named, was imprisoned in the Tower of London in 1585 for being a Roman Catholic. He was tried for high treason; found guilty, fined £10,000 and condemned to death. In the Tower of London, he was kept constantly in fear of execution for 10 years. Queen Elizabeth I said that if he attended a Protestant Service, he could see his wife and son and his honours would be restored but Howard responded: 'If my religion be the cause for which I suffer, sorry I am that I have but one life to lose'.

Form Saints

St Edmund Campion



St. Edmund Campion was part of a group noted for its educational, missionary, and charitable works. Campion joined the first mission to minister the Catholics of England who were strictly forbidden to practice their religion.

After preaching at secret Catholic meetings, Campion created a sensation by having 400 copies of his pamphlet denouncing Anglicanism, distributed before a service in Oxford.

Under severe torture he refused to give up his religious convictions and was convicted of treason.

He was executed by being hung drawn and quartered.

St John Fisher



Saint John Fisher was an English Roman Catholic Bishop, Cardinal and Martyr.

When the question of Henry's divorce from Queen Catherine arose, Fisher declared that he was ready to die if marriage could be dissolved.

He was executed in the Tower of London by King Henry VIII for refusing to accept Henry as Head of the Church of England. Fisher was taken from his cell to be executed for treason. He was so weak that he had to be supported but clung onto his copy of the New Testament. John Fisher was canonized a Saint due to his example of learning, holiness, faith, loyalty and courage.

St Robert Southwell



Robert Southwell, English poet and martyr, is remembered for his saintly life as a Jesuit priest during a time of Protestant persecution.

He was ordained a priest and made prefect of studies at the English College at Rome.

He returned to England as a missionary when he became chaplain to Anne Howard and spiritual adviser to her husband, the 1st Earl of Arundel (St Philip Howard).

He was tortured in an attempt to make him reveal the whereabouts of his fellow priests and imprisoned in the Tower of London in solitary confinement.

In 1595, he was tried for treason and executed. Southwell was arrested in 1592 while celebrating mass.

St Margaret Clitherow



St Margaret Clitherow was brought up in Protestant England and converted to Roman Catholicism.

She refused to attend the Anglican Church and was repeatedly fined but was later imprisoned for nearly a year.

Clitherow allowed secret masses to be celebrated in her home, where she also hid Roman Catholic missionary priests.

After further imprisonments and releases, she was seized in 1586 and refused to make a plea stating that only God could judge her. She was executed by being slowly crushed to death with an 800-pound weight.



SPH Feast Day



St Philip Howard showed our key value of 'responsibility' as he gave up his own human desires in this life in pursuit of morality and commitment to his faith.

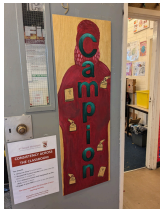
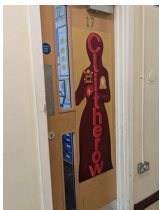
He said: 'The more affliction we endure for Christ in this world, the more glory we shall obtain with Christ in the next.'

On the 23rd October, students and their Form teachers commemorated St Phillip Howard and the Saints associated with each form. They also did this by creating door displays of their Saint and then delivering a presentation to the other year groups about the positive values each Saint demonstrated as examples for our own values in life.

Firstly in period 1, students learned about their Form Saint and how they showed responsibility.

Followed by period 2 and 3, which involved creating the moral for their door and a short presentation, that was then presented in assembly.

On Friday the 25th October, each Form Teacher then chose three of their most responsible students to join a rewards afternoon in the Hall.



Pebbles for Permanence

Last year, on our St Philip Howard Feast Day, all students decorated a pebble in remembrance of a loved one or with a name or image of something which they wanted to remain with them as a symbolic of a person or memory they brought them comfort. The pebbles were arranged and cemented into a small rockery at Student Reception as a reminder every time students walk in and out each morning and the end of each day. Others are also to be added to our allotment as part of a peace garden.



Remembrance Sunday



On Sunday the 10th November

Remembrance Sunday is marked on the closest Sunday to Armistice Day, also known as Remembrance Day. On 11th November we will remember the service and sacrifice of all those that have defended our freedoms and protected our way of life. The day commemorates the contribution of British and commonwealth military and the civilian servicemen and women the the two World Wars and later conflicts.

In school assembly we will take a moment of silence to remember those we have lost, we will also be raising money for the British legion, by collecting denotations.

Black History Month

In the month of October, students celebrated Black history month. Honouring the courageous and invaluable contributions of black individuals throughout black history. Students gained valuable insights into Black history throughout the whole of their curriculum, including, actives and challenges to complete during lesson time.



National Inclusion Week

National Inclusion week is dedicated to celebrating inclusion by making spaces more inclusive to everyone. This will be celebrated from Monday 25th to Sunday 1st October.

Day 1: Social emotional mental health - Peers will greet students at the door as they come in to lesson and ask them for a number between 1-5 to indicate how they are feeling, 1 being the lowest and 5 being the highest.

Day2: Cognition & Learning - Throw and catch questions, students will write on pieces of paper and throw into the middle of the room. Then students will pick closest to them and read allowed.

Day3: Physical & Sensory - Brain breaks are a powerful and effective way to address self - regulation needs. We can do by moving around, maybe do some jumping jacks.

Day 4: Communication and interaction - Try something different such as calming music, group discussions or role playing.

Day 5: No coping from the board! - This is working towards no pen day in November, students will not copy text from the board.



Mental Health Awareness

On Thursday, the 10th of October, we will be focusing on the health and wellbeing of oversleeves and everyone around us. Our Catholic faith teaches us the importance of caring for our whole selves, including a mental and emotional health. Teachers and students are encouraged to wear something yellow to support mental health day. Students will be given activities to complete to help them focus on how we are feeling, expressing and communicating with others in a way that aligns with our catholic values. Prayer and meditation can be a powerful tool for managing stress and promoting mental well-being.

SPH EXPERIENCE DAY

On our first SPH Experience Day of the year, Year 8 and 9 students embark on an enriching journey, visiting the International Slavery Museum in Liverpool and the National Holocaust Centre in Newark. These trips were carefully designed to deepen students' understanding of significant historical injustices while fostering growth in alignment with our Catholic values.

- Students explore the harsh realities of the transatlantic slave trade.
- They learned about the lasting impact of the slave trade on societies and cultures worldwide.
- The experience encouraged students to reflect on catholic virtues of justice and respect.
- It promoted empathy for those who suffered.
- students recognised the importance of equality and human dignity.
- Students gained insights into the horrors of the holocaust
- The experience served as a profound reminder of the need for compassion, forgiveness, and a commitment o peace.
